Presidents Introduction

Scouting is different to all other youth organisations. It was not founded as someone's idea, and then spread out from the centre Instead, Scouting was the spontaneous reaction of boys all around the country to a great series of fortnightly papers, which of course later became the book, *Scouting for Boys". Boys, and later girls, liked the ideas in the publications so much, that they started to try them out. That is when they found that it was useful to have adults to help them. And so Scouting has grown from the individual Troops, with adults helping them, with a central organisation only coming into being to support the local efforts, all sealed by a Royal Charter. It is this history that has made Scouting and Guiding the most successful youth organisations in the country, still based upon the individual Groups with great volunteers, with a national structure existing only to support them. That is how we have such marvellous volunteers, people who would never be involved if it was just a paid job.

The ScoutsCymru AGM and Celebration of Scouting Awards is an event that I look forward to year on year. It provides us with the opportunity to come together and celebrate the fantastic efforts of our volunteers and young people.

I was delighted that numbers have grown in ScoutsCymru again this year, seeing an increase in the majority of the sections. It is through the innovative and exciting programmes week after week that this increase is possible and ensures that young people across Wales are able to access Scouting and develop invaluable Skills for Life that so many of us, myself included, use in our personal and professional lives.

June 2018 saw another fantastic All Wales Scout Camp, organised by a team of dedicated and inspirational volunteers from across the nation. Throughout the weekend young people had the opportunity to try their hand at new things, learn

from new experiences and form friendships – some of which will last a lifetime. Thank you to all involved in the organisation of the event including the event team and the Explorer Service Team.

In December 2018 we saw the announcement of Rhian Moore as ScoutsCymru's new Chief Commissioner. Rhian wasted no time before she set to work, ensuring that she listened to volunteers through her survey and gathered opinions from across Wales. She has taken those views on board and has been using her first year in post to put together a team who can support volunteers in all elements of Scouting and I'm looking forward to meeting lots of the new team at this year's AGM.

Also, this year, Welsh Government released their plan for the Curriculum for Wales 2022 which highlights the need for community impact and for young people to develop into ambitious and informed citizens. This has the potential to be exciting for Scouting as we have been delivering this through our groups since 1907. The new curriculum also focuses on how young people can be active within their communities and make a difference to causes which they are passionate about – work which we are already leading on through our A Million Hands initiative. Scouting has the opportunity to dovetail into this new Curriculum and demonstrate to a wider audience the impact that we can have on young people.

In an ever changing and developing world, the Scouting values are constant and more vital than ever. Young people are showing us every day how much they care about the world around them. We need to focus our efforts on supporting our members to apply and grow these values to make changes within their communities.

Report from the Chair



It gives me much pleasure to present my second report from the Chair to the ScoutsCymru Council.

Scouting across UK was rebranded in 2018. Our rebranding in ScoutsCymru has been particularly successful. Alongside the new branding, Scouting's new strategy, focussing on providing Skills For Life, has been rolled out across Wales. In ScoutsCymru we work to ensure that Scouting's four strategic pillars of planning, programmes, people and perception dovetail with the goals of our national Wellbeing of Future Generations legislation.

I continue meet and learn so much from our fantastic Volunteers and Sections. The innovative and exciting All Wales Scout Camp in June 2018 was a particular highlight and I pay tribute to the dedicated organising team and everyone involved. Our guests were so impressed. It was good to show Future Generations Commissioner Sophie Howe how Scouting improves the life and wellbeing of young people. I am also grateful to those who showcased Scouting at July's Royal Welsh Agricultural Show. At recent visit to a sailing weekend, it was great to see the tremendous training and fun given by the excellent ScoutsCymru Water Activities Team (SWAT), and I do not forget the excitement and opportunities offered at Cornel and at ScoutsCymru's own mountain leadership centre, Yr Hafod. I also have attended most of our Area AGMs. This year I have heard several presentations from ScoutsCymru Explorers who attended the recent World Scout Jamboree in America, in West Virginia. What tremendous experiences they had and what great lessons they learnt from that international engagement. That is what Scouting is all about!

After bidding farewell to Gareth Watson in October 2018, in December 2018 the ScoutsCymru Board was delighted to welcome Rhian Moore as our new Chief Commissioner. Previously Commissioner Communications, as well as being Chief Commissioner, Rhian is an Assistant Scout Leader. She heads Internal Communications in GWR, and is also Chair of the Chartered Institute of Public Relations Cymru. An excellent leader and communicator, Rhian is working to build Team Cymru to ensure the right support to grow Scouting across Wales and to deliver Skills For Life for young people in all our communities.

I am pleased to confirm that ScoutsCymru accounts remain in good order and am grateful to our Treasurer, Dom Winfield for his hard work. Our strategy requires us to grow Scouting in Wales. In recognition of that the Board has authorised an expansion of the dedicated ScoutsCymru HQ Team, now settled in the new offices in Caerphilly. With resources increased and upskilled, the HQ Team will provide even better and enhanced support to Areas, Districts and Groups. Engagement with national and local stakeholders will increase; all for the greater benefit of Welsh Scouting.

Good governance is essential for good Scouting. On the ScoutsCymru Board we are filling the gaps in our trustees' skills sets and we reach out and engage with Area Chairs. To ensure we continue to provide good governance at all levels, a long-term governance review is underway. The review will be inclusive, supportive and incremental.

Given the grassroots development and growth of Scouting, it is unsurprising that the exact status of much of Scouting's property assets is hazy, whether they be at Group, District, Area, or ScoutsCymru level. Therefore, in tandem with, and in support of the governance review, it seems sensible and reasonable to map those property assets to make sure they are fit and compliant for the 21st Century, and that they provide the right facilities, opportunities and support for our Volunteers and Sections.

We are so lucky. Scouting in Wales has unrivalled opportunities. Our culture is rich and our mountains, lakes, forests and coastline provide an adventure playground that is unique. Let us carry on working together to grow Scouting to offer Skills For Life to young people in all our communities.





Income 2018 - 2019 (£)








Expenditure by type 2018 - 2019 (£)












Expenditure by category 2018 - 2019 (£)

The sum of... to ScoutsCymru of Castle House, Caerphilly, CF83 1LH for the general purposes being in law charitable of the said ScoutsCymru AND I DIRECT that the receipt of the honorary treasurer or other officer approved of by my trustees of the aforesaid Council shall be a sufficient discharge to my trustees.

OR

All of the residue of the estate both real and personal and wheresoever situate after payment thereout of my debt funeral and testamentary expenses ScoutsCymru of Castle House, Caerphilly, CF83 1LH for the general purposes being in law charitable of the said ScoutsCymru AND I DIRECT that the receipt of the honorary treasurer or other officer approved of by my trustees of the aforesaid Council shall be a sufficient discharge to my trustees.

OR

Share of my estate to ScoutsCymru of Castle House, Caerphilly, CF83 1LH for the general purposes being in law charitable of the said ScoutsCymru AND I DIRECT that the receipt of the honorary treasurer or other officer approved of by my trustees of the aforesaid Council shall be a sufficient discharge to my trustees.

Your bequest, whatever its size, will help us give future generations of young people in Wales from all walks of life a better start.
